# OUR CIVIC TOOLS

#### **Arts**

When combined, art and nature allow us to examine the natural world through a unique lens that not only inspires the artist, but creates moments of connection and understanding for those engaged with the art.

- Artists across cultures and centuries have amplified the natural world through their work. In what ways is today's art amplifying messages about nature?
- Artists often use nature in their creative process. How does the use of wood, clay, water, graphite and even fire shape the creative process?
- How does the movement of wind, the flow of water, and the rootedness of trees inspire and inform artmaking?
- How have artists, past and present, used nature as tools, subject matter, or inspiration?



## **HUMANITIES**

Combining the cultural and natural worlds is a way to engage others in deep reflection on what it means to be human in the world – both philosophically as well as ethically and morally as stewards of the natural world. The humanities can also help us tackle "the nature of . . ." a myriad of questions and concerns people are eager to grapple with in meaningful ways.

- How might poetry and literature be used to delve into our relationship with the environment?
- How do different cultures relate to nature?
- What lessons can we learn from nature regarding adaptation, systems, and emergence?
- How can the environmental humanities help us understand our beliefs, values, and choices when addressing the climate crisis?

### RELIGION

Almost all the world's religions address the Earth's creation and view that creation – nature – as an act of divinity. Sacred scriptures and teachings have a lot to say regarding our interactions with and responsibilities toward nature.

- What do the world's religions teach about nature and why does it matter?
- Do sacred teachings on nature across traditions share commonalities? What are their differences?
- How have religious traditions and theologies affected our view of nature?
- How might spiritually inspired music, visual art, dance, and theater connect us to nature?



Fire shows that sometimes things have to burn to make new growth possible. Water reflects, not only the birthing of new beans, but also new ways of being. Earth provides a material connection to deep time and origins of all life.

Air brings us closer to our ancestors and the spirit world so that we can manifest that which is yet to be imagined. Together the elements teach us about regenerative and intergenerational cycles of life.
